LEW GAMERMAN

I became interested in bridge when I was 8 years old from watching my mother's bridge club and then developed my game by watching "Goren on Bridge" on Saturday morn-



ings. I was an avid rubber bridge player until 2003 when Bob McCaw introduced me to the joys of duplicate bridge. Since then I have retired and devoted my life to playing and teaching bridge. I have been the co-coach of the Brandeis bridge team, with Adam Grossack, for the last 5 years and I have been helping Jeff Lehman with developing young peoples' interest in the game. I always stress to clients and students; BRIDGE IS A GAME, first and foremost, and should be fun as well as it should satisfy the competitive spirit.

FREDERICK BROWN

Please consider my candidacy to the Board of EMBA. I am an ACBL member in a small new club. I retired this past summer. I have served on many boards and would



like to contribute to EMBA. I have been playing bridge since my days in the army in the early 1950s. I have found it to be a worthwhile way to meet people. Since I have enjoyed the fellowship of bridge players all these years, I have decided to volunteer my time to this organization. I have been impressed by the quality of leadership and the objectives of EMBA.

Justice Brown didn't send what follows, but we found this online:

Frederick L. Brown was born in Chicago, Illinois. He received a B.A., cum laude, from Harvard College in 1954. After serving in the United States Army for ten years, he entered Harvard Law School, where he received his LL.B. in 1967. From 1967 to 1969 he served as chief law clerk to the justices of the Superior Court. Justice Brown then engaged in private practice in Boston. After serving as regional counsel for the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, he joined the faculty of Northeastern University School of Law in 1973.

Associate Justice 1976-2003 Recall Justice 2003

In 1976, Gov. Michael Dukakis appointed Judge Brown to the Appeals Court, making him the Commonwealth's first African-American appellate judge. Throughout his career Justice Brown has been involved in many educational and philanthropic activities, including service as a member of the Board of Trustees of Northeastern University since 1977 and as a trustee of the Dana Farber Cancer Institute since 1995. He was affiliated with the Lena Park Community Development Corporation for many years as a director, Housing Division chairman, and chairman of the board. Justice Brown was an Alvin Brown Fellow at the Aspen Institute in 1977 and was awarded an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from New England School of Law in 1989.

EDWARD JOU

Two years ago, I joined the MIT bridge club beginner lessons. The teachers' depth of knowledge and enthusiasm for the game was contagious, and I soon found myself consumed by



the game. Through the novice classes, I made friends with other newbies and learned from masters. I began going to sectionals and met many friendly faces who loved the game as much as I did. STANLEY RICHMOND



LISA PROCTER


I started playing bridge eight years ago. My father in-law was a great bridge player and I only regret not learning sooner.






Today we are often shown optimal results and are challenged to figure out how the computer arrived at them. When we see all four hands, it's a "Double Dummy" Problem. Today's hand is one of the best I have ever seen and it was shared with me recently by John McDermott of West Roxbury, one of my mentors, and the first ever recipient of the Larry Weiss Award (1981), given to a gifted bridge player in New England who demonstrates "superior behavior and gracious presence at the table" – qualities that John epitomizes.

Contract: 6 Spades by South Opening lead ♣J

Now I will show you the hand and ask you stop reading until you have found the solution – or give up trying!





First, a comment about the bidding. East's double is what is called a Lightener Double - named after one of the bridge stars of yesteryear, Theodore Lightener. It usually suggests a void, or asks partner to lead the dummy's first bid suit. West had to guess between clubs and diamonds and was afraid to lead away from the ♦K. As you can see, an opening diamond lead would result in the defense getting the first 6 tricks on a cross ruff! As it turned out, the opening lead, and the auction, presented declarer with a blueprint of how to play this hand.

OK, are you ready to read about the solution to today's hand?

Declarer has 3 club tricks, 6 spade tricks, 1 diamond and 1 heart. He knows that hearts are 7-0 and by inference, that East is very likely to be void in diamonds. He could cash 3 top clubs, but then there would be no way to make the hand, also, the ♣9 in dummy presents the option of a potential 4th club winner if the opponents are forced to lead that suit. With East known to have all the hearts and presumably no diamonds, declarer could see that if his trumps were extracted, East could not win the Ace of hearts without presenting declarer with an entry to dummy. That was an important clue. To create this position, declarer would need to keep the \$\forall 10xx in dummy after drawing trumps, and he would also need to keep all 3 of his hearts in his hand.

With a heart trick under his belt, if declarer could endplay West, he could gain access to dummy's clubs or score a 2nd diamond winner - but how? If he ruffed the opening lead, he would have to pitch his ♣9 on his third round of trumps, or pitch a second diamond, making an endplay on West impossible. Therefore - If he wins one club in dummy and pitches ♦5 from his hand, and then draws trumps, he'll arrive at this position:



Now, declarer can lead a high heart from his hand, and East must duck – or he presents declarer with his contract. After scoring his heart trick, if declarer leads the \, Q, and West is kind enough to win the K, West will have an impossible return. If he returns a diamond, declarer will win the 10 in dummy and cash his two high clubs. If he returns a club, declarer has the marked finesse of the 9 and will score 3 club tricks to make his slam. So, what if West ducks the ♦Q? Now declarer is doomed! If he plays Ace and a diamond, West will win and just continue diamonds.

So let's go back to trick one! What if declarer discards the ♦Q on the first club? After drawing trumps, he plays the ♥K - which has to hold the trick - and gets to the ending as shown. Declarer will then have ♦Axx, instead of ♦AQx, opposite 10xx. Now when declarer plays a low diamond towards dummy, West can't duck and he is cooked! If he ducks, the 10 wins. If he wins and returns a diamond, the 10 is an entry. If he returns a club, he finesses the 9. Go thru it again. It is a fabulous hand!!!

Today's Shark's Pointers:

- 1. Double dummy problems are great tools to help improve card play technique – and they are not altogether fantasy hands!
- 2. The bidding and early play will often reveal the distribution and location of all the cards so play really is a double dummy exercise. The heart preempt and the Lightener double revealed that there was a void in the long heart hand. It wasn't clubs, so that void had to be in diamonds.
- 3. When tackling a complicated hand, take it piece by piece. This was a great problem. It was actually possible to deduce all the clues needed from the bidding. The first clue was to see that a heart trick could be taken – without losing a trick. Everything else rotated around that. The other clue was getting rid of the ♦Q.
- 4. On defense, you don't always have to win a trick, just because you can. Think about what will happen if you win, or if you duck!
- 5. The Lightener Double is a great tool. Study this convention and discuss it with your favorite partners. It'll pay big dividends.
- 6. Let's all try to aspire to be as gracious and talented as John McDermott and all the other 19 Larry Weiss Trophy winners. And if you know of someone worthy of the honor, please let me know!
