SHOW ME THE MONEY!

Show me the way to the North American Pairs

Duplicate bridge players are accustomed to playing for masterpoints. But starting this year, the ACBL will award **cash prizes** to the top two pairs who qualify from each district and play in the North American Pairs national competition. However, if you want a chance to win—you've got to qualify at a local club game.

Top grass roots event

"The North American Pairs, or NAP (formerly the NAOP) is an annual event that starts at the club level with special qualifying games and ends with a championship event at the Spring NABC," says Jo Anne Collins, ACBL Special Events Manager. Qualifying club games pay extra masterpoints. If you score in the top half of the field or your flight or score 50% or higher in a qualifying game in your district, you are eligible to play in the district final, a flighted event held in Sturbridge on October 20-21. You can play in as many qualifying games as you wish—and you can qualify with more than one partner. The top three pairs in flights A (2000+), B (0-2000) and C (0-500/non life master) in the district competition are eligible to play in the national NAP competition at the 2008 Spring NABC in Detroit. The top two qualifying pairs receive cash awards. Plus, the three districts with the most tables playing in qualifying events for each flight are eligible to send additional pairs—and to earn additional cash prizes for their teams.

During June, July and August, EMBA clubs will run dozens of NAP qualifiers. For a complete list of qualifying games, see the Special Club Games calendar on page 5 or go to www.acblemba.org.

The North American Pairs has been around for 25 years—and New England's District 25 has distinguished itself in several ways. The very first NAP was won by two EMBA players who were Harvard students at the time—Eric Robinson and Arthur Moore. Two other District 25 pairs have won the flight A event, making New England one of only four districts in the country with three winners in the event. This year EMBA's Flight C winners, Jan Popiel and Murat Azizoglu, were the only New England pair to finish in the money at the St. Louis NAP, placing ninth in the two-day event. "It might have been Flight C," says Popiel, "but the competition was strong. We played well, and we didn't get any gifts."

Why players love the NAP

Players in qualifying games like the bonus masterpoints. Pairs who qualify for the district final get to play against top local competition. Then, there's the prize money. Each first-place winner in all three flights receives \$700 (\$1400 for the pair) to play in the 2008 Spring NABC in Detroit. Each second- place winner receives \$300. Past winners received subsidized housing and/or airfare, but cash gives pairs more discretion over their spending.

How to deal with misbehavior and ethical violations

We've all been there: An opponent comes to the table, still badgering partner about a bid or a play. Voices rise. You ask them to stop. Exasperated, you call the director. The director handles the problem with a warning or by assessing a matchpoint or IMP penalty. You feel that further action against the offender is warranted. Your options at this point depend on whether the incident occurred at an EMBA-sponsored game or a club game.

Misbehavior at EMBA events

If the incident takes place at an EMBA sectional tournament, a unit championship or a STaC game, there are two further ways to address misbehavior by another player: 1) In the case of egregious behavior you can file a formal complaint with the Unit Charging Officer (the Recorder in the case of EMBA) requesting a disciplinary hearing. A complaint received by the Charging Officer will be evaluated, and, if appropriate, charges against the offending individual

will be filed with the Unit Disciplinary Committee. The person filing the complaint is expected to testify at the hearing. If found guilty, a player may receive a reprimand, a period of probation and/or suspension or even expulsion from the ACBL. 2) You can submit a report in the form of a Player Memo to the Unit Recorder asking him to investigate the incident and take appropriate action, which could include a formal complaint. Unless you are certain that a formal complaint is appropriate, it is best to leave that determination up to the Recorder. The Recorder can judge the seriousness of an infraction and will know whether a player has a history of misbehavior.

Misbehavior at club games

When the misbehavior occurs at a regular club game, you should direct your complaints to the club manager and/or its director. They are responsible for dealing with misbehavior at their games. If you are dissatisfied with how the club handles your complaint, your options are more limited: Put up with it or play at another club.

Matters of ethics

There are many forms of questionable ethical behavior that violate the Laws of Contract Bridge. One common example is taking advantage of unauthorized information from partner's hesitations in the bidding or play. There is nothing wrong with taking time to think, but if a bid or play is not made in

normal tempo, partner is not entitled to any inferences that may arise from the hesitation. Hesitating when following suit with a singleton is another common violation, as is any body language that could deceive declarer or convey information to partner. However, even if these behaviors seem deliberate, they are just as often subconscious. A new or inexperienced player may not even know that these actions are improper. Rather than trying to decide which is which, call the director and explain the situation in a polite, non-accusatory manner. (Accusing someone of cheating is itself a very serious ethical violation.) The director will provide redress if he or she feels it is warranted. You also have the option of reporting such incidents to the Recorder regardless of where they occurred. Often it will be enough for the Recorder to draw a player's attention to the misdeed and educate him or her about appropriate ethics (or behavior). In the event of serious or repeated ethical breaches, the Recorder may file charges against the individual with the Unit Disciplinary committee. One last point: Before being quick to criticize others, perhaps each of us should try to set a good example with our own behavior.

The execution of a simple squeeze is one of the toughest concepts for a student of bridge, but it's also one of the most commonly occurring opportunities in the game. Approximately one in seven bridge deals will have a squeeze or a squeeze-like characteristic. Learn how to master squeeze play, and you can achieve significantly improved results as declarer. The process is easier if you keep in mind the acronym—SHARK!

See the ending before it occurs.

Hold on to threat cards as you discard on the run of your winners.

Allow your next-to-final winner to be in the same hand as a threat card.

Rectify the count—Lose all but one of the tricks that you know you must lose.

Keep communications open—either to cash the threat card that will now be high, or to get back to the other hand that holds a winner and the other threat card that will now be unguarded by the squeezed opponent.

Now, take a look at the diagrammed deal, which earned declarer a well-deserved top. At trick 11, he executed a squeeze that he knew was almost 100% certain to succeed. Here's why: South opened the bidding four spades and that ended the auction. He won the opening lead in dummy with the Q of clubs and led a spade to West's Ace. West tried a diamond and declarer put in the Q, which held. When East didn't cover, declarer was pretty sure that the K of diamonds was with West. Next came a low heart from dummy, to which East thought a moment and then played low.

Declarer ruffed, crossed to dummy with a trump and ruffed a second heart. Next, he ran all his spades to reach the four-card ending that you see on the bottom of the diagram above.

On the lead of the K of clubs, West pitched the J of hearts. East earlier pitched the Q of hearts, so declarer realized that if East had started with the A and Q of hearts, he would have played the Q on the first play of the suit. So the A of hearts had to be with West. On the lead of the club 8 towards dummy, West was forced to either discard the A of hearts or pitch down to the

singleton K of diamonds. He chose the latter, which only delayed the inevitable. Declarer played a diamond to his A and cashed the diamond J for his 12th trick.

The key elements of this squeeze were: 1) to recognize the potential or actual location of the winning high cards (diamond K only card higher than declarer's J, and heart A only card higher than dummy's K) in the same opponent's hand, 2) to rectify the count to have enough winners to take all but one of the remaining tricks, 3) to cash all those winners, being careful not to discard the threat cards (in this case, dummy's K of hearts), and 4) to maintain communications so that the squeeze card (club A) is in the same hand as one threat (heart K), and there is an entry (the diamond 8) to get back to a winner (diamond A) and other threat card (diamond J).

Squeeze play is tough work at first, but by going over hands such as this one, it won't be very long before you start thinking—and playing—like a shark.
